Dear Foreperson Conlin:

Pursuant to California Government Code § 933.05(a) the Acalanes Union High School District is responding to findings of Grand Jury Report No. 1405, The Public Records Act In Contra Costa County.

FINDINGS

1. The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Public Records Act (CPRA).

The District agrees with the finding.

Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

The District agrees with the finding.

3. Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance.

The District can only assume that the Grand Jury report is correct regarding Contra Costa County's periodic training and agrees with the finding as stated.

4. The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.

The District can only assume that the Grand Jury finding is correct and agrees with the finding as stated.

5. The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have a delayed response or fail to respond entirely.

The District can only assume that the Grand Jury finding is correct and agrees with the finding as stated.

6. Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

The District can only assume that the Grand Jury finding is correct and agrees with the finding as stated. Specific to the AUHSD, District employees are familiar with their responsibilities when a CPRA request is made and respond timely to the request.

7. Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

The District partially disagrees with the finding. Annual Audits are included on the AUHSD website. There are many other public record documents of great value included on the District website that improve public agency transparency and permit "the public to better monitor the functioning of the government and reduces the likelihood of waste, fraud and corruption." Posting Statements of Economic Interests and Employment Contracts on the World Wide Web could result on the unintended consequences. The documents are readily available to the public through public records requests.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access to public records.

The recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted. The District believes that its Governing Board Policy 1340 is adequate and serves the public well. "The Governing Board recognizes the right of citizens to have access to public records of the district. The Board intends the district to provide any person reasonable access to the public records of the schools and district during normal business hours and within the requirements of state and federal law."



2. Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests.

The recommendation has been the District practice for many years. Therefore, the recommendation has been implemented.


- 3. Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available in their websites:
 - a. Statements of Economic Interests
 - b. Employment Contracts
 - c. Annual Audits
 - d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements
 - e. Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

The recommendation has been implemented for c and e. The recommendation for a, b, and c will not be implemented because it is not warranted and is not reasonable. Most Economic Interest Statements, employment contracts, and travel reimbursements contain personal information that could be used for identity theft if posted on the World Wide Web. Redacting personal information to make it available on the web would be time consuming. Consistent with the District's Board policy, the documents are available for inspection at no charge and for production at nominal charge upon request. These records are accessible to the public.

Due to not having full knowledge of the Board of Superintendent's process for reporting activities as the Grand Jury may have, Antioch Unified School District can only partially agree with this finding – by partially agreeing we are assuming that the Grand Jury's assessment is accurate.

Finding #5

The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have a delayed responses or fail to respond entirely.

Response to Finding #5

Due to not having full knowledge of the other cities' reporting activities as the Grand Jury may have, Antioch Unified School District can only partially agree with this finding – by partially agreeing we are assuming that the Grand Jury's assessment is accurate. Antioch Unified School District is responsive to the requests for information.

Finding #6

Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

Response to Finding #6

Antioch Unified School District disagrees with this finding if it is applied to the District. The District employees responsible for responding to these requests are well aware of the CPRA provisions and do comply.

Finding #7

Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

Response to Finding #7

Antioch Unified School District agrees that these are appropriate documents to have available for public review when requested. The District does not agree that these are the <u>most</u> valuable documents that could be included on websites.



The District is not aware of any evidence, nor is any provided, of this statement of fact. As such, the District can neither agree nor disagree with this finding. In the case of the District, we believe our employees responsible for CPRA responses are generally familiar with the Act and their related responsibilities.

Finding 7

Among the most valuable documents that could be included in websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

Response

We agree with this finding.

This recommendation has been implemented within the District. The District's key responders have attending training provided at professional conferences, generally delivered by attorneys. Attending such training will continue to be encouraged.



Recommendation #1:

Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public access to public records.

Response to Recommendation #1:

This recommendation requires further analysis. The Better Government Ordinance is complex and creates an additional administrative burden beyond what is required by law. If adopted and procedural matters are not carried out correctly, interested parties may use legal processes to void actions, resulting in additional expense and disruption to operations. School districts do not generally retain specialized legal staff to address these requirements. District staff will review the Better Government Ordinance, and consult with the MUSD Governing Board to determine whether or not the district should adopt a similar policy. This review and consult shall take place before December 3, 2014.

Recommendation #2:

Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests.

Response to Recommendation #2:

The recommendation has already been implemented. District staff who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests are trained on how to respond, as these requests are received. Additionally, a formal refresher training will be offered to all district office staff during the 2014-15 school year, in which they are provided with a copy of the Act, and given internal guidelines on responding as legislation requires.

Recommendation #3:

Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their websites:

- a. Statement of Economic Interests
- b. Employment Contracts
- c. Annual Audits
- d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements

Response to Recommendation #3:

The recommendation has been implemented with respect to (c) and (e). Annual audits and all public meeting agendas/supporting documentation are posted on the district website. Additionally, warrant registers are included in the Board packets, which show payments for items such as travel reimbursements. These Board packets are posted on the website. The recommendation will not be implemented with respect to (a), (b), and (d) because it is not reasonable or warranted. Economic Interest Statements, employment contracts, and travel reimbursements may contain personal information that, while publicly disclosable, is not appropriate for publication on the worldwide web. Redaction of home addresses, personal telephone numbers, personal email addresses, and signatures for web presentation would be cost-prohibitive. These types of documents remain available for inspection at no charge and for production at nominal charge upon request. Additionally, payment information for all items is reflected in monthly warrant registers, which are included in the Board packets and posted on the website.

RESPONSE TO RECOMMENDATION 1

The recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted or is not reasonable. The current level of access and response is very high at MDUSD. The reason that an expanded sunshine policy may not be appropriate is the large share of the records kept by the District relate to minors and such records may not be released without the consent of the parents under federal and state law. MDUSD has a higher obligation under federal and state law to maintain confidentiality of student information.

RECOMMENDATION 2

Travel and Entertainment reimbursements. *The recommendation requires further analysis.* We will need to review the numbers of reimbursements to be converted to electronic format and the time and the cost of a conversion to website posting. This study will be reviewed in fall 2014 and the Board may consider this recommendation.
- e. Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings. *The recommendation has been implemented*. The Superintendent posts all agendas and supporting documents on its page on www.mdusd.org. The documents go back to 2004-05 school year.

Response: Due to not having full knowledge of the impact of this Ordinance as the Grand Jury may have, San Ramon Valley Unified School District can only partially agree with this finding – by partially agreeing we are assuming that the Grand Jury's assessment is accurate.

5. The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, which others have delayed responses or fail to respond entirely.

Response: Due to not having full knowledge of the impact of this Ordinance as the Grand Jury may have, San Ramon Valley Unified School District can only partially agree with this finding – by partially agreeing we are assuming that the Grand Jury's assessment is accurate.

Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

Response: the San Ramon Valley Unified School District disagrees with this finding if it is applied to the SRVUSD. SRVUSD employees responsible for responding to these requests are well aware of the CPRA provisions and do comply.

7. Among the most valuable documents that can be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

Response: The SRVUSD agrees that these are appropriate documents to have available for public review when requested. The District does not agree that these are the <u>most</u> valuable documents that could be included on websites. SRVUSD does post agendas and supporting documents on the website.

RECOMMENDATIONS

 Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public access to public records.

Response: The recommendation requires further analysis. The Better Government Ordinance is complex and creates an additional administrative burden beyond what is required by law. If adopted and procedural matters are not carried out correctly, interested parties may use legal processes to void actions, resulting in additional expense and disruption to operations. School districts do not generally retain specialized legal staff to address these requirements.

2. Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests.

Response: The recommendation has been implemented.

- 3. Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on the their websites:
 - a. Statement of Economic Interests
 - b. Employment Contracts
 - c. Annual Audits
 - d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements
 - e. Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings

Response: The recommendation has been implemented with respect to (c) and (e). The recommendation will not be implemented with respect to (a), (b), and (d) because it is not reasonable or warranted. Economic Interest Statements, employment contracts, and travel reimbursements may contain personal information that, while publicly disclosable, is not appropriate for publication on the worldwide web. Redaction of home addresses, personal telephone numbers, personal e-mail addresses, and signatures for web presentation would be cost-prohibitive. The type of documents remain available for inspection at no charge and for production at nominal charge upon request.

The West Contra Costa Unified School District (District) is in receipt of Contra Costa County Grand Jury Report No. 1405, "The Public Records Act in Contra Costa County" (Report).

In accordance with California Penal Code §933.05(a), the District's response to each of the numbered Findings is as follows:

- 1. The District agrees with the Finding.
- 2. The District neither agrees nor disagrees with the Finding. The District has no basis on which to evaluate the impact of Contra Costa County's Better Government Ordinance on the County's policy of transparency in government.
- 3. The District neither agrees nor disagrees with the Finding. The District is not in a position to know whether Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the California Public Records Act (CPRA) and the Better Government Ordnance.
- 4. The District neither agrees nor disagrees with the Finding. The District is not in the position to know whether responses to CPRA requests by county departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.
- The District neither agrees nor disagrees with the Finding. The District is not in the position to determine whether the response to CPRA requests by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven.

The District is a public school district, not a city or special district. As applied to itself, the District partially disagrees with the finding. The District's responses to CPRA requests are consistent, responsive, and in the majority of instances, prompt. In instances where a response may be delayed, it is due to the logistics of identifying, collecting, reviewing, and redacting responsive documents.

- 6. The District neither agrees nor disagrees with the Finding. The District has no basis to evaluate whether employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested. As applied to itself, the District disagrees wholly with the finding. District employees who deal with CPRA requests are familiar with the Act and the responsibilities of the District when records are requested.
- 7. The District agrees with the Finding.

In accordance with California Penal Code §933.05(b), the District's response to each of the numbered Recommendations is as follows:

- 1. The Recommendation requires further analysis. The District currently adheres to the CPRA. Further analysis is necessary to determine whether adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance is feasible under the District's current staffing levels, bargaining unit contracts, and technological resources. The impact of such a policy on the District's business would also need to be evaluated. A further response will be provided within a six month timeframe.
- 2. The Recommendation has not yet been implemented. The District will arrange for training for all of its employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests. It is the District's goal to complete the training no later than the end of the 2014-2015 school year.
- 3. The Recommendation has been partially implemented. The collective bargaining agreements applying to each represented unit, annual audits, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings are available on the District website, www.wccusd.net. The Recommendation will not be implemented as to individual employment contracts to protect the privacy interests of the respective employees and to guard against the public release of information which may lead to fraud and identity theft. Nevertheless, the District will respond to all requests for employment contract information in compliance with its obligations under the California Public Records Act. The Recommendation will not be implemented as to travel and expense reimbursements as the burden for a district of our size in terms of administrative time required to collect and post such information on the website outweighs the benefit of on-line access to it. Nevertheless, the District will respond to all requests for travel and expense reimbursement information in compliance with its obligations under the California Public Records Act.



On behalf of the Antioch City Council, this letter responds to Contra Costa County Grand Jury Report: "The Public Records Act In Contra Costa County." The City Council authorized this response at its meeting on July 22, 2014.

We appreciate the time and effort that you and the Grand Jury spent considering these matters. We trust that the Grand Jury also appreciates the City time spent reviewing and responding to Grand Jury reports, particularly given Antioch's continued weekly furloughs and 33% staffing reductions. Pursuant to California Penal Code section 933.05, the City will respond to each finding and to each recommendation individually.

Findings

<u>Finding #1:</u> "The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Public Records Act (CPRA)."

The City agrees with this finding as to governmental records. One could also say that the State of California's policy of transparency as to governmental meetings and decisions is embodied in the Brown Act.

<u>Finding #2:</u> "Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance."

The City agrees and partially disagrees with this finding. The City has not seen the County's ordinance nor has received any information regarding how the ordinance has changed the County's transparency. However, the City does not dispute that the the Grand Jury has found that the ordinance enhances the County's transparency.

<u>Finding #3:</u> "Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance."

The City agrees and partially disagrees with this finding as the Government Code does not provide the option of stating that the City cannot comment on this finding. Again, the City has not seen the County's ordinance, or their training program.

<u>Finding #4:</u> "The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate."

The City agrees and partially disagrees with this finding as the Government Code does not provide the option of stating that the City cannot comment on this finding. The City has no directly knowledge of County department's responsiveness to Public Records Act requests.

<u>Finding #5:</u> "The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have delayed responses or fail to respond entirely."

<u>The City agrees with this finding.</u> The City does not have direct knowledge of the practices of other public agencies, but it is not surprising that many agencies struggle to provide timely and complete responses to CPRA requests, especially given the reduced staffing most have experienced over the last several years.

<u>Finding #6:</u> "Ernployees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested."

<u>The City agrees with this finding.</u> Again, the City does not have direct knowledge of the practices of other public agencies, but it is not surprising that public employees have varying familiarity with the Public Records Act due to short staffing and employees being assigned multiple, varying duties.

<u>Finding #7:</u> "Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statement of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings."

The City agrees with this finding; although, there are certainly other valuable documents such as General Plans and budgets. We are unfamiliar with the concept of "Entertainment reimbursements".

Recommendations

Recommendation #1: "Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access public records."

<u>The recommendation has not been implemented</u>. At this time, the City of Antioch will simply continue to comply with the provisions of the CPRA.

Recommendation #2: "Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests."

<u>The recommendation has been implemented</u>. The City of Antioch pursues and encourages training opportunities for our staff responsible for responding to CPRA requests.

Recommendation #3: "Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their website:

- a. Statements of Economic Interests
- b. Employment Contracts
- c. Annual Audits
- d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements
- e. Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings."

The recommendation has been partially implemented. At this time, the City of Antioch makes the annual audits, travel reimbursements and agendas with supporting documents for public meetings available on our website. We don't reimburse employees or officials for entertainment. Meals are reimbursed under our travel and training policy. The employment agreements and the Statements of Economic Interests are not currently on our website, but will be reviewed for implementation within the next year.

We trust that the Grand Jury will find these responses helpful to its endeavor.



FINDINGS

Grand Jury Finding 1

The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Public Records Act (CPRA).

City Response: The City agrees with the finding, however there are additional statutes including the Ralph M. Brown Act and the Political Reform Act that also relate to transparency in government.

Grand Jury Finding 2

Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

City Response: The City neither agrees nor disagrees with the finding, as the City has not received copies of Contra Costa County's policies related to transparency in government, nor does the City have direct knowledge of whether the County's transparency in government has been strengthened and, if it has, whether the strengthening was caused by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

Grand Jury Finding 3

Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance.

City Response: The City neither agrees nor disagrees with the finding, as the City does not have direct knowledge of what training may be held for Contra Costa County employees.

Grand Jury Finding 4

The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.

City Response: The City neither agrees nor disagrees with the finding, as the City does not have direct knowledge of the response time of Contra Costa County departments to CPRA requests, nor whether such responses are appropriate.

Grand Jury Finding 5

The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have a delayed response or fail to respond entirely

City Response: The City neither agrees with nor disagrees with the finding, as the City does not have direct knowledge of the response times or the responses of other cities and/or special districts.

Grand Jury Finding 6

Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

City Response: The City neither agrees with nor disagrees with the finding; as the City does not have direct knowledge of the familiarity with the CPRA by employees of other cities and special districts who deal with CPRA requests. The City of Brentwood has held two training sessions for its employees regarding their responsibilities for responding to CPRA requests.

Grand Jury Finding 7

Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

City Response: City agrees that the above documents are valuable, but cannot state that they are the <u>most</u> valuable documents as there could be others that are equally, or more valuable.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Grand Jury Recommendation 1

Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access to public records.

City Response: This recommendation has been has been implemented. The City Council adopted City Council/Administrative Policy 00-8, Policy for Responding to Public Records Requests, which reiterates that the City will provide copies of documents in accordance with the CPRA and the California Constitution.

Grand Jury Recommendation 2

Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests.

City Response: This recommendation has been implemented. Following the adoption of City Council/Administrative Policy 00-8, Policy for Responding to Public Records Requests, and two citywide trainings were held for employees who are responsible for responding to CPRA requests.

Grand Jury Recommendation 3

Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their websites: a) Statements of Economic Interests; b) Employment Contracts; c) Annual Audits; d) Travel and Entertainment reimbursements; and e) Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

City Response: The City has partially implemented this recommendation. Agendas and supporting documents for the City Council, City commissions and standing Council Subcommittees; as well as videos of the City Council and Planning Commission meetings have been online since 2002.

In addition to the documents listed above, the City also posts Campaign Finance Documents on the City's website.

Further, the City's Finance and Information Systems Department posts the following documents on the City's website: Annual Property Tax Summaries, Bond Official Statements, Budget in Brief, Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Budgets, Combined Community Facilities District (CFD) Annual Report for Special Taxes Levied, Comprehensive Annual Financial Reports (CAFRs), Cost Allocation Plans, Successor Agency Reports, General Fund Fiscal Models, Operating Budgets, Public Facilities Fee Reports (AB1600), Quarterly Sales Tax Reports, Quarterly Treasury Reports and State Controller's Reports.

Finally, the City has begun the process of analyzing its options and ability to place Statements of Economic Interests and Travel & Entertainment Reimbursements on its website.

The City of Clayton, California provides the following response to Civil Grand Jury Report No. 1405, "The Public Records Act in Contra Costa County", issued by the 2013-14 Contra Costa County Civil Grand Jury on 03 June 2014. Pursuant to page 6 of the Report, the City is required to respond to Findings 1 through 7 and Recommendations 1 through 3 adhering to format guidelines prescribed by the California Penal Code (Section 933.05).

FINDINGS

1. The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Public Records Act (CPRA).

City Response

The City agrees with this Finding.

2. Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

City Response

The City agrees this Finding is the Civil Grand Jury's conclusion to its review but the City of Clayton has no independent knowledge to confirm or reject that conclusion.

3. Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance.

City Response

The City agrees this Finding is the Civil Grand Jury's conclusion to its review but the City of Clayton has no independent knowledge or facts to confirm or reject that conclusion.

4. The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.

City Response

The City agrees this Finding is the Civil Grand Jury's conclusion to its review but the City of Clayton possesses no independent knowledge or facts to confirm or reject that conclusion.

5. The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have a delayed response or fail to respond entirely.

City Response

The City disagrees with this Finding as Report No. 1405 did not specifically identify which public agencies fell into which CPRA rating category by the Civil Grand Jury, and therefore the City of Clayton has no specific facts to evaluate and review for determination. Further, the City of Clayton staff recalls the anonymous request for the specific public record identified within Report No. 1405 on page 4 and notes this City responded swiftly and correctly to that Public Records Act request.

6. Employees of cities and some districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

City Response

The City disagrees with this Finding as it relates to the City of Clayton and its employees. Regarding the broader Finding as to employees of other cities and some districts, the City agrees this Finding is the Civil Grand Jury's conclusion to its review but this City has no independent knowledge or discovery of other public agencies' training and resulting competency concerning the CPRA to reach the same conclusion.

7. Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

City Response

As worded, the City disagrees with this Finding as most other public documents uploaded to a city's website are considered just as important and often more valuable to the public performance of city business than those listed above. Examples include its General Plan, Municipal Code, Zoning Map, City Budget, job employment opportunities, public employee salary schedules and employee benefits, or even community events and other public resources as integral to the primary operations of a city.

Within the context of Civil Grand Jury Report No. 1405 and its particular scope of review, the City agrees with this Finding as it pertains to public meeting agendas, agenda packet materials and staff reports, Audited Financial Statements of the City, Statements of Economic Interests, and employment contracts, but disagrees with the Finding for the need to upload travel and entertainment reimbursements due to the City's minimal expense for that purpose.

RECOMMENDATIONS

 Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access to [sic] public records.

City Response

The recommendation will not be implemented because in the City of Clayton's case and circumstance it is not warranted and is not reasonable.

This City's organization and scope of operations are miniscule in comparison to the purview of the County of Contra Costa. The City of Clayton regularly abides by and follows the Ralph M. Brown Act (Government Code section 54950 et. seq.) and the California Public Records Act (Government Code section 6250 et. seq.), which are the essential and functional ingredients embodied in the County's "Better Government Ordinance". Further, there is no demonstrated necessity or contravening evidence suggesting this City establish a permanent citizen's oversight committee for such purpose.

2. Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests.

City Response

The recommendation has been implemented as the City's City Clerk and other management personnel responding to CPRA requests receive real time training and advice from the City Attorney and the City Manager when presented with a CPRA request or when questions arise as to the qualifying document(s).

- 3. Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their websites:
 - a. Statements of Economic Interests
 - b. Employment Contracts
 - c. Annual Audits
 - d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements
 - e. Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

City Response

The recommendation has been implemented for most parts (a, b, c & e) but is unwarranted and will not be implemented as it pertains to part d, as detailed below:

Statements of Economic Interests.

Has been implemented and uploaded onto the City's website.

b. Employment Contracts.

Has been implemented and uploaded onto the City's website. Employment contracts have always been previously available to the public and on the City's website when submitted as Agenda materials for City Council approval.

c. Annual Audits.

Has been implemented and uploaded onto the City's website. Annual Audited Financial Statements of the City have always been previously available to the public and on the City's website when submitted as Agenda materials for City Council approval.

d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements.

Will not be posted and updated onto the City's website as it is unwarranted due to miniscule expenses incurred for such purposes.

Each fiscal year budget contains the annual allocations for City travel and business meetings. By previous Civil Grand Jury Report No. 1104 recommendation (2010-11), this City includes in its annual budget a chart summarizing annual calendar expenses for and of its elected City officials, which categories include training and City meeting expenses. Further, due to on-going budgetary constraints, City expenses for meals and entertainment have been virtually eliminated in the City Budget for the last eight (8) years.

Over the course of many years, most City-related meeting expenses incurred by members of the City Council are paid directly by its members from personal funds and are not reimbursed by the City. Any travel expenditures of the City are made available upon request through the CPRA.

e. Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

Has previously been implemented and always been a part of the City's website.

This letter serves as the City of Concord's response to the Contra Costa Grand Jury's findings and recommendations set forth in Report No. 1405, entitled "The Public Records Act in Contra Costa County."

I. FINDINGS

<u>Finding No. 1</u>: "The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Public Records Act (CPRA)."

Response to Finding No. 1: The City of Concord agrees with this finding.

Finding No. 2: "Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance."

Response to Finding No. 2: While the City of Concord agrees that the Better Government Ordinance was adopted by Contra Costa County with the salutary goal of strengthening transparency in government, the City of Concord does not have comprehensive information on the extent to which that policy has been implemented, and thus is unable to provide an informed response to this finding.

Response to Finding No. 5: The City of Concord disagrees with this response as it pertains to Concord. The City of Concord does not have any information regarding this finding as it pertains to other cities and special districts within Contra Costa County, and therefore is not in a position to provide an informed response as to those cities and special districts.

Finding No. 6: "Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested."

Response to Finding No. 6: The City of Concord disagrees with this response as it pertains to Concord. The City of Concord does not have any information regarding this finding as it pertains to other cities and special districts within Contra Costa County, and therefore is not in a position to provide an informed response as to those cities and special districts.

<u>Finding No. 7</u>: "Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings."

Response to Finding No. 7: The City of Concord agrees with this finding in respect to agendas and supporting documents for public meetings and Form 700 Statements of Economic Interest filed by the City Council, the City Manager and the City Attorney, but disagrees with the remaining portion of this finding.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS

Reccomendation No. 1: "Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access to public records."

Response to Recommendation No. 1: This recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted. The City of Concord has already adopted Policy and Procedure No. 27 ("Public Records Inspection and Fees) which is analogous to the Public Records portion of Contra Costa County's Better Governance Ordinance. This policy is periodically reviewed for required updates.

Recommendation No. 2: "Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests."

<u>Response to Recommendation No. 2</u>: This recommendation has been implemented. The City Attorney's Office and City Clerk's Office provide training to all Department Heads and employees who handle Public Records Act requests.

<u>Recommendation No. 3</u>: "Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their websites:

- a. Statements of Economic Interests
- b. Employee Contracts
- c. Annual Audits
- d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements
- e. Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings."

<u>Response to Recommendation No 3</u>: This recommendation has been implemented in part, but is unwarranted and will not be implemented as to certain public records, as discussed below.

- a. The City has included a statement on the website that refers interested parties to the FPPC website to view the Statements of Economic Interest filed for all 82700 filers. Interested persons are directed to the City Clerk's office for immediate access to the Form 700 files for the 123 individuals who file a Form 700, Conflict of Interest, with the City of Concord.
- b. Any employment contract that requires City Council approval is available on the website for review as part of the supporting documents to an agenda. Any other employment contract will be made available upon request.

- c. The annual Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the years 2002-2013 on the City's website at http://www.cityofconcord.org/citygov/finance/reports as are the City Budgets.

The Fiscal Budget contains the annual amount of funding allocated for travel and meetings, and it is reviewed at a public meeting. Most entertainment expenses incurred by the City Council are paid for by the Councilmember directly and are not reimbursable. All travel expenditures are made available upon formal request.
- e. Public meeting agendas and supporting documents, annotated agendas, and minutes for the past five years are available on the City's website. An on-demand video library of meetings for the same period is also available to the public for review via the website at http://www.cityofconcord.org/citygov/agendas/council/.

<u>Response:</u> Danville partially disagrees with Finding #2. The Town cannot address the practices of other entities, including whether or not the County's transparency has been strengthened since its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

<u>Finding #3:</u> Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance.

<u>Response:</u> Danville partially disagrees with Finding #3. The Town cannot address the practices of other entities, including how often or whether or not Contra Costa County

<u>Finding #4:</u> The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.

<u>Response:</u> Danville partially disagrees with Finding #4. The Town cannot address the practices of other entities, including whether or not County departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors provide timely or appropriate responses to the CPRA.

<u>Finding #5:</u> The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have a delayed response or fail to respond entirely.

<u>Response:</u> Danville partially disagrees with Finding #5. The Town cannot address the practices of other entities, including their level of responsiveness. The Town's practice is to fully comply with the California Public Records Act. In fact, the Town strives to respond to inquiries as soon as possible, often within 24 hours of each request.

<u>Finding #6:</u> Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

<u>Response:</u> Danville partially disagrees with Finding #6. The Town cannot address the practices of other entities. The Town has designated the City Clerk as the point of contact for all CPRA requests, with an alternate point of contact in the City Clerk's absence. Town staff are fully aware of the Act and have received training as to their responsibilities when records are requested.

<u>Finding #7:</u> Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interest, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

Response: Danville partially disagrees with Finding #7. The Town agrees that annual audits, agendas and supporting documents for public meetings and employment contracts are valuable documents that could and should be included on public agency websites, as the Town does. Statements of Economic Interest are among the least requested documents through CPRA requests. Entertainment activities are not reimbursable by the Town and therefore cannot be included on the Town website. Travel expenses are approved as part of the budget process and therefore would be covered under the agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

Grand Jury Recommendations

Recommendation #1: Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access public records.

Response: This recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted. Danville provides for public access to government records and information beyond state law and the California Public Records Act. Financial information, audits, meeting agendas and supporting documents and employment contracts are among the public documents readily available to the public on the Town's website. Adopting a policy similar to that of the County of Contra Costa would not change the Town's practice of being as transparent as possible.

<u>Recommendation #2:</u> Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests.

<u>Response:</u> Danville has implemented this recommendation. Staff who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests undergo regular training on the subject matter.

Recommendation #3: Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their websites:

- a. Statements of Economic Interests
- b. Employment Contracts
- c. Annual Audits
- d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements
- Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings

Response: This recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted. The Town complies fully with the CPRA. The Town currently provides considerable information via its website, including employment contracts, annual audits, and agendas and all supporting documents for public meetings on the Town website (3.b, 3.c and 3.e above). This includes a bi-monthly Register of Audited Demands that includes all Town expenses (including 3.d). Practically speaking, the Town endeavors to include information which is most frequently requested, while responding to other individual requests received in a timely manner, and within the parameters established in the CPRA.

El Cerrito's policy for noticing meetings, posting agendas, staff reports and minutes and making other documents available online exceeds the requirements stated in the Brown Act and CPRA.

Finding No. 5: The response to CPRA requests by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have a delayed response or fail to respond entirely.

<u>Response</u>: Lafayette cannot agree or disagree with Finding No. 5. We do not have first-hand knowledge of the timely and appropriate responses of other cities and special districts within Contra Costa County to CPRA requests.

Finding No. 6: Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

<u>Response</u>: Lafayette partially disagrees with Finding No. 6. We do not have first-hand knowledge how other cities and special district deal with CPRA requests. The employees of the City of Lafayette are familiar with the Act and their responsibilities when records are requested.

Finding No. 7: Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statement of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

Response: Lafayette partially agrees with finding No. 7. The city has posted Statement of Economic Interests for the City Manager, Administrative Services Director, Mayor, Councilmembers, City Attorney and Planning Commissioners, Employment Contracts for the City Manager and City Attorney, Annual Audits, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings. Entertainment activities are not reimbursable by the City and therefore not included on the city website. Travel expenses are approved as part of the budget process and available with agendas and supporting documents.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

 Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access to public records.

City response: Agree. The Council adopted Resolution 2009-39 Implementing the Lafayette Open Government Statement and Policy on June 22, 2009, providing disclosure of key financial data and practices in a document and forum that is open and widely available to the public on the front page of the city website. We are in receipt of your Contra Costa County Grand Jury Report 1405: "The Public Records Act in Contra Costa County" and this letter outlines our response to the findings and recommendations that are outlined in the report in accordance with California Penal Code Section 933.05.

The City of Pinole appreciates the work that the Grand Jury undertook, and we generally agree with the statements in the Report that we are cognizant and wholeheartedly agree with the need for transparency and open government, and ongoing training related to ethics, conflict of interest, and compliance with the Public Records Act.

GRAND JURY FINDINGS SPECIFIC TO THE CITY OF PINOLE

Finding Number 1

"The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Records Act."

Response: The City of Pinole agrees with this finding.

Finding Number 2

"Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance".

Response: The City of Pinole agrees with this finding that the Better Government Ordinance was adopted by Contra Costa County with the goal of strengthening transparency. It appears from your report, from reading the County ordinance and from our experience with accessing information on the web that the goal has been accomplished.

• Finding Number 3

"Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance".

Response: The City of Pinole agrees with this finding, and has reviewed the Better Government Ordinance (BGO) and also viewed the County on-line video regarding the Brown Act. The City Attorney and City Clerk will develop and conduct a training program for employees within the next several months.

Finding Number 4

"The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate".

Response: The City of Pinole agrees with the finding, as represented in the BGO Section 25-4.204, stating that a one-day initial response is extremely responsive. While the City of Pinole currently attempts to make initial contact within a day or two, it is not always possible for a small agency with limited staffing.

Finding Number 5

"The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some cities are responsive, while others have delayed responses or fail to respond entirely".

Response: The City of Pinole disagrees with this finding as it pertains to Pinole, and does not have information to be able to make an informed response regarding the timeliness of other agency responses. Public records request officially filed with the City Clerk are logged, tracked, and disseminated to the correct staff in order to be responsive to the requestor in a timely manner.

Finding Number 6

"Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested".

Response: The City of Pinole generally agrees with this finding, but does not have knowledge of other agencies familiarity with the Act and their responsibilities.

Finding Number 7

"Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings".

Response: The City of Pinole agrees with this finding with respect to most items listed in Finding 7. The listed documents, as well as campaign finance reports, and annual budgets are available on the City of Pinole website, with the exception of Entertainment reimbursements. Our officials do not receive reimbursement for Entertainment. Reimbursements to staff and officials are part of the warrant lists approved by the City Council and available on the website in the Agenda supporting documents for each Council meeting.

GRAND JURY RECOMMENDATIONS SPECIFIC TO THE CITY OF PINOLE

Recommendation Number 1

"Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access to public records".

Response: The City of Pinole currently complies with all aspects of the California Government Code Chapter 6250-6270 - Public Records Act and has a Public Records request form with information on the City website. However, the City does agree with the recommendation and believes there is always room to improve, and will implement a procedures paper to enhance the level of information to the public regarding obtaining records by the end of the year. The City also has a portal available in City Hall to view Council ordinances, resolutions, meeting minutes, and building permits.

Recommendation Number 2

"Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests".

Response: The City of Pinole agrees with the recommendation. The City Attorney and City Clerk will provide training to all employees who handle public records.

Recommendation Number 3

"Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their websites":

- A) Statement of Economic Interests
- B) Employment Contracts
- C) Annual Audits
- D) Travel and Entertainment reimbursements
- E) Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings

Response: This recommendation has already been implemented in the City of Pinole; most all of these documents and numerous other documents are available to the public on the City website, as discussed below:


- 1. The City had included the Form 700 Statement of Economic Interest for all 87200 Code filers (Council, Treasurer, City Manager, City Attorney and Planning Commissioners) on the website. Interested parties are directed to the City Clerk's office to review Form 700 form for all individual filing in Pinole, and are available for immediate review with a binder at the counter available upon request.
- 2. The City Manager's contract is available for review on the City website. All other contracts are available upon request.
- 3. The annual Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for FY 2012/13 is on the City's website, along with special audits of Measure S sales tax measure for the years of 2010 2013, and budgets for current fiscal year and the past six years.
- 4. The City of Pinole does not have an Entertainment budget, and travel / training reimbursements are not posted on the City's website, but all reimbursements are found on the Warrant Lists which are part of the supporting documents for Council agendas. The City budget contains the annual amount of funding allocated for travel and training, and is reviewed at a public meeting prior to adoption. The City of Pinole has severely cut travel and training in the past six years and many expenses incurred by the City Council associated with the office, are paid for by the council member directly and are not reimbursable.
- 5. Public meeting agendas, supporting documentation and minutes for the past two years are available on the City website. An on-demand video library of meetings for the same period is also available for public review via the website at http://www.ci.pinole.ca.us/admin/meeting_agendas.html

In closing, I would like to thank the Grand Jury again for their efforts with these municipal service reviews and annual reports. I hope that this response meets the expectations of the Grand Jury and that transparency in local government continues to be a focal point.

As requested, the following is in response to Grand Jury Report No. 1405, "The Public Records Act in Contra Costa County" in the format you have requested. Please note that because many of the Grand Jury's findings are general and not necessarily specific to the City of Pittsburg, we do not have a basis to agree or disagree on many findings since we do not all have all of the information to review from the cities/agencies in Contra Costa County as the Grand Jury did when they prepared the report.

List of Findings

1. The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Public Records Act (CPRA).

City of Pittsburg Response: (1) Agree with the finding.

2. Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

City of Pittsburg Response: (2) Disagrees with the finding. Adoption of an ordinance by an agency is unnecessary. The CRPA is sufficient to allow full transparency in government if followed correctly. Also, the City of Pittsburg does not receive County ordinances and cannot make a judgment call as to whether or not this document would strengthen a state law, or whether or not it has strengthened Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government.

3. Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance.

City of Pittsburg Response: The City of Pittsburg cannot comment on this finding as we have no way of knowing whether or not the County conducts such training. The City of Pittsburg DOES conduct bi-annual training of each department on the CPRA. The City Clerk, along with City Attorney staff, attends departmental meetings bi-annually and as needed to review our procedures. Pittsburg Administrative Order No. 039 – Policy Directive Regarding Procedures for Public Records Act Requests was issued in January 2008. A copy is attached. Administrative Orders are also available on our website.

4. The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.

City of Pittsburg Response: The City of Pittsburg cannot comment on this finding as we have no way of knowing whether or not this is a true statement.

5. The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have a delayed responses (sic) or fail to respond entirely.

City of Pittsburg Response: The City of Pittsburg cannot comment on this finding because we have not been given documents supporting this assertion. It would be helpful to see back-up to the Grand Jury's report.

6. Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

City of Pittsburg Response: The City of Pittsburg cannot comment on this finding as we have no way of knowing whether or not some cities and special districts are unfamiliar with the CPRA. City of Pittsburg employees are fully aware of the CPRA and our policy for records requests.

7. Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursement, and agenda and support documents for public meetings.

City of Pittsburg Response: (1) The respondent agrees with the finding.

List of Recommendations

1. Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access to public records.

City of Pittsburg Response: (4) The recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted or is not reasonable. The City of Pittsburg believes the CPRA is sufficient to allow full transparency in government if followed correctly. Adoption of an ordinance by an agency is unnecessary.

2. Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests.

City of Pittsburg Response: (1) The recommendation has been implemented. The City of Pittsburg has determined that it is necessary to train all staff members within each department on the proper way to respond to CPRA's, as any staff member may be asked for public records. We began training staff in 2006 and created our Administrative Policy 039 - Policy Directive Regarding Procedures for Public Records Act Requests which was issued in January 2008. Since that time the City Clerk and staff from the City Attorney's office has met with each department on a bi-annual basis, or as needed, for CPRA training.

- 3. Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under CPRA available on their websites:
 - a. Statements of Economic Interests
 - b. Employment Contracts
 - c. Annual Audits
 - d. Travel and Entertaining reimbursements
 - e. Agenda and supporting documents for public meetings

City of Pittsburg Response: (1) The recommendation has been implemented. The City of Pittsburg makes all of the above, with the exception of Statements of Economic Interests, available on our website. Our website contains a portal to our Electronic Document Management System (EDMS) and allows the public to obtain resolutions, ordinances, minute orders, contracts, minutes, etc. as well as full agenda packets for all public meetings. This has been functional and available to the public since 2005. City Council and Planning Commission meetings are video-streamed and archived meetings are also available.

Subject: Policy Directive Regarding Procedures for Public Records Act Requests

Purpose:

This policy provides to all City staff the information and tools necessary to effectively respond to public records act requests in a timely manner.

The California Public Records Act ("CPRA") serves an important purpose, and the City has an excellent record of responding to requests for public information in a timely manner. Recently, the quantity and scope of CPRA requests submitted to the City have increased substantially. The goal of this Policy Directive is to ensure that each request is handled in a timely, comprehensive and coordinated manner.

Overview

The CPRA (Government Code Section 6250 *et seq.*) is California's version of the federal Freedom of Information Act. The CPRA requires the City to make public records available for inspection or duplication upon request. A public record includes "any writing containing information relating to the conduct of the public's business prepared, owned, used, or retained" by the City. Virtually every document to which you have access as a City employee may be a public record.

However, certain public records are exempt from disclosure under the CPRA.² The majority of the exemptions were formulated to protect the privacy of individuals and confidential materials. Any decision to withhold or otherwise deny access to records responsive to a CPRA request must be made by the City Clerk's Office.

The City is required to make copies of records "promptly available" to a requester upon payment of fees for photocopying, if applicable. The CPRA requires the City to respond to a request for records within 10 calendar days.³ It should be noted that the City is not required to *produce* the responsive documents within 10 days. The City has a standard response letter for CPRA requests that complies with the requirements of the CPRA.

Frequently Asked Questions

Can we require a requesting party to use the City's standard CPRA request form?

No. A valid CPRA request may be made orally or in writing. The request may be made by letter, via email, by telephone, in person, or by any other means. The City's standard CPRA request form is on file with the City Clerk and available on the City's website. City staff should *encourage* a requesting party to utilize the City's standard request form, but the City cannot require a written request. City staff may not limit access to public records based upon the identity or purpose of the requesting party.

Does the City have a duty to assist the requesting party?

Yes. The City has an affirmative duty under the CPRA to help a requesting party identify the records responsive to a CPRA request. City must provide suggestions for overcoming any practical obstacles regarding access to the records or information sought. For example, City staff may be required to identify and help a requesting party access documents maintained electronically, off-site or on microfiche.

May the City charge for copies under the CPRA?

Yes. The City may require the payment of fees covering the "direct costs of duplication" prior to the production of responsive documents. Under the CPRA, the City may not charge a requesting party for staff time used to locate documents or process the request. The City Council established the City's standard copy fees by resolution. Please contact the City Clerk's office for information related to specific copy charges.

What if the City has no documents responsive to the request?

The requesting party should be notified that the City has no responsive documents. In certain situations, this may be an appropriate time to "assist the requestor" in an effort to identify documents in the City's possession. Under no circumstances does the CPRA require the City to create a new document to respond to a request.

Processing A Request

Certain requests may be handled informally by City staff. Requests for Ordinances, Resolutions, Municipal Code Sections, finalized agenda items, building permits, business licenses and minutes from City Council meetings may be filled by staff after department head notification. All other CPRA requests <u>must</u> follow three easy steps:

1. Reduce the request to writing: Ideally, a requesting party will fill out the City's standard CPRA request form. If the request is made orally, offer to provide the City's standard form and encourage the requesting party to fill it out. If the requesting party is unwilling to reduce its CPRA request to writing, document the request to the best of your ability on the City's standard form. Staff should thereafter send a written confirmation of the oral request

to the requesting party. This gives the requesting party the ability to correct any misunderstandings related to its request and provides the City with written confirmation of the request.

- 2. Contact the City Clerk's Office. The City Clerk's office is responsible for coordinating and tracking all CPRA requests received by the City. Upon receipt, immediately datestamp and hand deliver a copy of the CPRA request to the City Clerk. The City Clerk's office will thereafter coordinate the 10 day written response to the requesting party, City Attorney review of the responsive documents (if necessary) and production of the responsive documents. All 10 day response letters must be delivered under the City Clerk's signature. In the event that a requesting party seeks the inspection of documents, the City Clerk's office will coordinate use of a conference room or other suitable area for the document review. Under no circumstances is a member of the public allowed access to an employee work area to review documents responsive to a CPRA request. Any decision to deny access to City records must be made in writing by the City Clerk's office.
- 3. <u>Gather the Responsive Documents</u>. Upon direction from the City Clerk's office, City staff should begin to gather the documents responsive to the request. The City Records Manager will coordinate with staff to identify the most practical and efficient method for document collection. Requests that seek a large volume of documents or oversized documents may require additional attention and facilities. Do not produce documents responsive to a CPRA request without authorization from the City Clerk's office.

Compliance with this Policy Directive will ensure that all City document requests are handled in a timely, comprehensive and coordinated manner in compliance with the requirements of the CPRA. If you have any questions related to this Policy Directive, please contact the City Clerk's office.



The City of San Pablo provides this response to Grand Jury Report Nd. 1405, "The Public Records Act in Contra Costa County." in accordance with Callfornia Penal Code Section 933.05.

GRAND JURY FINDINGS SPECIFIC TO THE CITY OF SAN PABLO

GRAND JURY FINDING #1:

The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Public Records Act (CPRA).

RESPONSE: The City of San Pablo agrees with this finding.

GRAND JURY FINDING #2:

Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

RESPONSE: The City of San Pablo generally agrees with the concept behind this finding, but has not reviewed the County's policy.

GRAND JURY FINDING #3:

Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance.

RESPONSE: The City of San Pablo agrees with this finding but has no personal knowledge of the County's internal procedures.

GRAND JURY FINDING #4:

The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.

RESPONSE: The City of San Pablo agrees with this finding, but has no personal knowledge of the County's response timelines.

GRAND JURY FINDING #5:

The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some cities are responsive, while others have delayed responses or fail to respond entirely.

RESPONSE: The City of San Pablo partially agrees with this finding based on the assumption that some cities are more responsive than others. Public record requests officially filed with the City Clerk's office in the City of San Pablo are logged, tracked and disseminated to the correct department and/or staff in order to respond in a timely manner.

GRAND JURY FINDING #6:

Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

RESPONSE: The City of San Pablo partially disagrees with this finding. While it is certainly possible that isolated employees are unfamiliar with the Act, employees in the City of San Pablo are familiar with the Act and the responsibility to timely respond to public records act requests.

GRAND JURY FINDING #7:

Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

RESPONSE: The City of San Pablo agrees with this finding with respect to most items listed in Finding #7. The listed documents, as well as campaign finance reports and annual budgets are available on the City of San Pablo's website. The City of San Pablo does not reimburse city officials or employees for "entertainment." Reimbursements to staff and officials are included in the monthly periodic reports under the Vendor Check Register Report on the city council agendas.

GRAND JURY RECOMMENDATIONS SPECIFIC TO CITY OF SAN PABLO

Recommendation No. 1:

Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access to public records".

RESPONSE: The recommendation requires further study. There is no indication at this time that such a policy is needed in San Pablo. The City of San Pablo currently complies with all aspects of the Public Records Act. The City believes there is always room to improve in order to expand public access. The City has a Public Records Request Form with information on the City website, but does not require requests to be filed on such form. Public records requests are often emailed and responded to via email. The City publishes its city council meeting minutes and various other important documents on its website; is considering providing a kiosk at City Hall; and will make resolutions and ordinances available on the City website in order to enhance the level of information available to the public. The City will consider the need for a policy similar to the County policy by the end of the fiscal year.

Recommendation Number 2

Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests.

RESPONSE: The City of San Pablo agrees with and will implement the recommendation. The Deputy City Clerk will provide training to all employees who handle public records requests and look into seminars or workshops for those employees who handle public records requests to attend. Such training will occur by the end of the fiscal year.

Recommendation Number 3

Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their websites:

- A) Statement of Economic Interests
- B) Employment Contracts
- C) Annual Audits
- D) Travel and Entertainment reimbursements
- E) Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings

RESPONSE: This recommendation has already been implemented in the City of San Pablo. Most of these documents and numerous other documents are available to the public on the city website, as discussed below:

- a. The City has included the Statements of Economic Interests (Form 700) for all 87200 Code filers (City Council, City Treasurer, City Clerk, Planning Commissioners, City Attorney and City Manager). All other Form 700's are available for immediate review upon request at the counter in the City Clerk's Office.
- b. The City Manager's and City Attorney's contracts are viewable on the city website. All other contracts are available upon request.
- c. The City Financial Reports which include the City Budgets, Comprehensive Annual Financial Reports, Five Year Financial Forecast Fiscal Years 2013-2018, Financial Policies, and Single Audits are all viewable on the city website.
- d. The City of San Pablo does not have an Entertainment budget and travel/training reimbursements are not posted on the City's website. However, reimbursements to staff and officials are included in the monthly periodic reports under Vendor Check Register Report section of the city council agendas. The city budget contains the annual amount of funding allocated for travel and training and is reviewed at a public meeting prior to adoption.
- e. All public meeting agendas, supporting documentation and minutes from 2002 to present are viewable on the city website. The City of San Pablo has recently made available an on-demand video library of city council meetings beginning June 2014 for public review via the website at http://www.sanpabloca.gov.

In closing, we would like to thank the Grand Jury again for their efforts with these municipal service reviews and annual reports. We hope that this response meets the expectations of the Grand Jury and that transparency in local government continues to be a focal point.

Response: Agree

Finding No. 2: Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

Cannot Agree or Disagree: San Ramon has no knowledge of the effects of this ordinance.

Finding No. 3: Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance.

Cannot Agree or Disagree: No substantiating training information was provided.

Finding No. 4: The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.

Cannot Agree or Disagree: No substantiating information or data has been provided.

Finding No. 5: The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have a delayed response or fail to respond entirely.

Cannot Agree or Disagree as San Ramon only has knowledge of its responsiveness to CPRA.

Finding No. 6: Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the act and responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

Cannot Agree or Disagree as San Ramon only has knowledge of its own employees' understanding of CPRA.

Finding No. 7: Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

Partially agree. San Ramon posts Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings. Statements of Economic Interest are handled in accordance with FPPC regulations and State Law.

City of San Ramon Recommendations:

 Cities and special Districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access public records.

The recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted. The City promptly replies to all CPRA requests and follows State Law.



This correspondence will serve as the City of Walnut Creek's response to your June 3, 2014 letter regarding Grand Jury Report 1405 – The Public Records Act in Contra Costa County.

FINDINGS:

1. The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Public Records Act (CPRA).

<u>Response:</u> The City of Walnut Creek partially disagrees with the finding. In California, transparency in government is also promoted by open meeting laws such as the Brown Act (for local government) and the Bagley-Keene Act (for state bodies).

2. Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

<u>Response</u>: The City of Walnut Creek does not have any information regarding this finding, and therefore, is not in a position to provide an informed response.

 Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and the Better Government Ordinance.
 Response: The City of Walnut Creek does not have any information regarding this finding, and

therefore, is not in a position to provide an informed response.

4. The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.

- <u>Response:</u> The City of Walnut Creek does not have any information regarding this finding, and therefore, is not in a position to provide an informed response.
- 5. The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while other have a delayed responses or fail to respond entirely. Response: The City of Walnut Creek is responsive to all California Public Records Act requests received. The City of Walnut Creek does not have any information regarding this finding as it pertains to other cities and special districts within Contra Costa County, and therefore is not in a position to provide an informed response as to those cities and special districts.
- 6. Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.
 Response: The City of Walnut Creek disagrees with this finding as it pertains to Walnut Creek.
 The City of Walnut Creek is familiar with the Act and responds appropriately when records are requested. The City of Walnut Creek does not have any information regarding this finding as it pertains to other cities and special districts within Contra Costa County, and therefore is not in a position to provide an informed response as to those cities and special districts.
- 7. Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interests, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agenda and supporting documents for public meetings.

 Response: The City of Walnut Creek agrees with this finding in regards to agendas and supporting documents for public meetings, Employment Contracts and Annual Audits. In contrast, because the City of Walnut Creek infrequently receives requests for either Statements of Economic Interests or Travel and Entertainment Reimbursements, the City disagrees with the remaining portion of this finding. (Please see Response to Recommendation 3 for how the City of Walnut Creek ensures that the public has access to these records.)

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act request.

Response: The recommendation has not yet been implemented, but will be implemented in the near future. The City of Walnut Creek is in the process of developing an annual training for the Public Records Act (PRA) for employees responsible for responding to PRA requests. The process is expected to be completed by March 31, 2015 with trainings beginning in April 2015.

- 3. Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their websites:
 - a. Statements of Economic Interest
 - b. Employment Contracts
 - c. Annual Audits
 - d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements
 - e. Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

Response:

The City of Walnut Creek provides Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, and Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings on its website as follows:

- Employment Contracts: The City of Walnut Creek has only one employment contract. The City Manager Employment contract is available on the City's website at: http://www.walnut-creek.org/citygov/depts/admin/hr/labor.asp.
- Annual Audits: The annual Comprehensive Annual Financial Reports (CAFR) for fiscal year's ending 2012 and 2013 are available on the City's website at http://www.walnut-creek.org/citygov/city-budget/default.asp as are the City's biannual Budgets for fiscal years 2006-2008; 2008-2010; 2010-2012; 2012-2014; and 2014-2016.
- Agendas and Supporting Documents for Public Meetings: Public meeting agendas
 and supporting documents and minutes are available on the City's website as well
 as an on-demand video library of meetings at http://www.walnut-creek.org/services/citizen/granicus.asp.

With respect to Statements of Economic Interest and Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, the City of Walnut Creek provides the public with access to this information (see information that follows). The recommendation of the Grand Jury requires further analysis; the results of this analysis will be available within six months of the date of the Grand Jury report.

Statements of Economic Interest: At present, the City of Walnut Creek has included
a statement on the website that refers interested parties to the Fair Political
Practices Commission website to view the Statement of Economic Interests filed for
all members of the City Council (http://www.fppc.ca.gov/index.php?id=592).
Interested persons are directed to the City Clerk's office for immediate access to the

Form 700 files for designated staff who file a Form 700 with the City of Walnut Creek.

Travel and Entertainment reimbursements: Currently, this information is not posted
to the City's website. The 2014-2016 fiscal budget contains the amount of funding
allocated for travel and meetings, and it is reviewed at a public meeting. The City's
Travel and Reimbursement policy does not allow for reimbursement of
"entertainment" expenses. Any entertainment expenses incurred by the City Council
are paid for by the Councilmember directly and are not reimbursable. All disclosable
travel expenditures are made available upon request.

The City Council approved this response at their August 19, 2014 regular meeting.

FINDINGS

<u>Finding #1</u>: The State of California's policy of transparency in government is embodied in the California Public Records Act (CPRA).

CCWD agrees with the finding.

<u>Finding #2</u>: Contra Costa County's policy of transparency in government has been strengthened by its adoption of the Better Government Ordinance.

CCWD agrees with the finding.

<u>Finding #3</u>: Contra Costa County conducts periodic training of its employees regarding how to respond to requests for records under the CPRA and Better Government Ordinance.

As an independent special district, CCWD is not able to agree or disagree with the County's training practices. CCWD does provide periodic training to its employees relative to the CPRA and Better Government Ordinance.

<u>Finding #4:</u> The response to CPRA requests by departments reporting to the Board of Supervisors is generally timely and appropriate.

As an independent special district, CCWD is not able to agree or disagree with County departments' timeliness and appropriateness to responses for CPRA requests. CCWD does have a strong record of timely and appropriate responses to

CPRA requests, and has been awarded the Certificate of Transparency by California Special Districts Association.

<u>Finding #5:</u> The response to CPRA by cities and special districts within Contra Costa County is uneven. Some entities are responsive, while others have a delayed response or fail to respond entirely.

CCWD cannot attest to the responsiveness of other cities and special districts. CCWD is a special district and has a strong record of timeliness and responsiveness to CPRA requests.

Finding #6: Employees of cities and some special districts who deal with the CPRA requests are unfamiliar with the Act and the responsibilities of their agency when records are requested.

CCWD agrees with the finding but cannot attest to the familiarity of employees of other cities and special districts with the responsibilities of their agencies when records are requested under the CPRA. CCWD's employees are familiar with the responsibilities of the CPRA. CCWD uses its Public Affairs division as a clearinghouse for all CPRA requests to ensure a timely and appropriate response.

Finding #7: Among the most valuable documents that could be included on websites are: Statements of Economic Interest, Employment Contracts, Annual Audits, Travel and Entertainment reimbursements, and agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.

CCWD partially agrees with this finding. Documents available on the website versus provided on a requested basis are annotated under the response to Recommendation #3 below.

RECOMMENDATIONS

<u>Recommendation #1:</u> Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should consider adopting a policy similar to the Better Government Ordinance, expanding the right of the public to access their public records.

CCWD Code of Regulations 1.12 "Inspection of District Records" provides access to the District's records consistent with the CPRA and Better Government Ordinance.

<u>Recommendation #2</u>: Cities and special districts in Contra Costa County should arrange for periodic training of employees who are responsible for responding to Public Records Act requests.

CCWD employees responsible for responding to CPRA requests receive training on an annual basis, and as needed to reflect any changes in practice. Additionally, all employees who may come in contact with a CPRA are regularly reminded to forward all requests to the Public Affairs division for proper tracking and disposition.

<u>Recommendation #3:</u> Cities and special districts should consider making certain public records that are clearly disclosable under the CPRA available on their websites:

- a. Statements of Economic Interests Available upon request.
- b. Employment Contracts Available on District website.
- c. Annual Audits Available on District website.
- d. Travel and Entertainment reimbursements Available on District website as part of agendas and supporting documents for public meetings.
- e. Agendas and supporting documents for public meetings Available on District website.

WHEREAS, the California Legislature has found that access to information concerning the conduct of the people's business is a fundamental and necessary right, per California Government Code Sections 54950, et seq; and

WHEREAS, "Sunshine Week" was initiated by the American Society of News Editors to educate the public about the importance of open government; and

WHEREAS, James Madison, the father of the United States Constitution, wrote that "consent of the governed" requires that the people be able to "arm themselves with the power which knowledge gives"; and

WHEREAS, "Sunshine Week" coincides with James Madison's birthday on March 16th because he wrote the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution that guarantees freedom of speech and press – and by extension the right and need of the people and press to know what their government is doing; and

WHEREAS, every citizen in our constitutional republic and under State Statutes has a right of open access to government meetings and public records; and

WHEREAS, an open and accessible government is vital to establishing and maintaining the people's trust and confidence in their government and in the government's ability to effectively serve its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the protection of every person's right of access to public records and notice of government meetings is a high priority of Pleasant Hill Recreation and Park District; and

WHEREAS, Pleasant Hill Recreation and Park District is committed to timely notice, openness and transparency in all aspects of its operations and seeks to set a high standard in this regard; and

TOWARD THAT END, Pleasant Hill Recreation and Park District will strive to earn the California Special District Associations (CSDA) District Transparency Certificate of Excellence, which includes some of the items listed below:

- Proof of current ethics training for all board members, timely filing of State Controller's Special Districts Financial Transactions and Compensation Report.
- Display names of board members and their terms of office, board meeting schedules, agendas, minutes, and the District's mission statement on the website, www.pleasanthillrec.com.
- Provide a regular district newsletter, website information, and email communication on the District activities and projects.

NOW, THEREFORE, Pleasant Hill Recreation & Park District commits during this Sunshine Week, March 10 – 16, commemorating the 262nd anniversary of James Madison's birth, and throughout the year 2013, to work diligently to enhance the public's access to government records and information; to increase information provided electronically and online; and to ensure that all meetings of deliberative bodies under its jurisdiction, and their committees, are fully noticed, open to the public; and that, whenever possible, audio recordings of public meetings shall be undertaken.
